HISTORY OF ST. JUDE

St. Jude, also known as St. Jude Thaddeus, brother of James the Less, was one of the 12 Apostles. The legend states that St. Jude was born into a Jewish family in a town in Galilee and that his father was murdered because of his outspoken devotion to Christ. His mother was a cousin to the Virgin Mary and his father a cousin of St. Joseph.

Ancient writers tell us that after Jesus' ascension into heaven, St. Jude preached the Gospel in many countries. Everywhere he taught people to be humble and meek and love God. A 14th century writer said that St. Jude was the bridegroom at the wedding at Cana. St. Jude was the one who asked

Jesus at the Last Supper why He would not manifest Himself to the world after His resurrection. Very little else is known of his life.

St. Jude is often shown with a flame above his head. This represents his presence at Pentecost, when he received the Holy Spirit with the other apostles. St. Jude is traditionally depicted carrying the image of Jesus in his hand or close to his chest. Occasionally, he is represented holding an axe or club, as he was brought to death by one of these weapons. In some instances, he may be shown with a scroll or a book (The Epistle of St. Jude) or holding a carpenter's rule.

Saint Jude suffered martyrdom about 65 AD in Galilee with the apostle Simon, with whom he is usually connected. Sometime after his death, Saint Jude's body was brought to Rome and placed in a crypt in St. Peter's Basilica. St. Jude Thaddeus is invoked in desperate situations. His New Testament letter stresses that the faithful should persevere in the environment of harsh, difficult circumstances, just as their forefathers had done before them. Therefore, he is the patron saint of the sick and of desperate and lost causes.

Saint Jude and Simon are venerated together on their shared feast day, October 28th.

SAFE AND CARING SCHOOLS



ALLERGY ALERT SCHOOL

The St. Jude Catholic School community supports the philosophy of inclusion and will endeavor to create a safe school environment for all staff and students. Precautions will be taken to ensure that the setting in which anaphylactic students spend the majority of their time be as safe and allergen free as possible.

It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to provide the school with information relating to their child's allergy and to provide the school with up to date Epi pens and specific information from a physician. Please contact your child's teacher.

An anaphylactic reaction is a severe, sudden, possibly life-threatening allergy to such items as peanuts, nuts, bee stings, shellfish, etc. When a student is diagnosed with anaphylaxis, it is important for the school to take extra precautions to ensure the student's well being. We have many students at St. Jude Catholic School with severe allergies.

In order to create a safe environment for these students, nut **products** are not permitted in any areas of our school. We thank you for your co-operation. under "Safe Schools" or ask your principal for more information.

ADMINISTRATION OF ORAL MEDICATION

The Durham Catholic District School Board Administration of Oral Medication recognizes that it will occasionally be necessary to administer oral medication to students at the school. Under these special circumstances, parent(s)/guardian(s) will be asked to sign a consent form giving permission for school personnel to administer the medication. It is understood that this consent form needs to be re-signed each school year. These forms can be picked up at the office or from Mrs. Frederick, our Program Support Teacher.

SAFE ARRIVAL POLCY

The Durham Catholic District School Board *Safe Arrival Policy* ensures the safe arrival of each student and our attendance is monitored each morning and afternoon. Each teacher is required to submit a list of students who have not arrived for either morning or afternoon classes. The office staff then makes contact with the home of any student whose absence has not been explained.

SUPERVISION OF STUDENTS BEFORE AND AFTERSCHOOL

As was the case in 2015-2016, parents and guardians are reminded of the following:

Daily supervision starts at 8:45 a.m. There are no staff members prior to 8:45 to supervise students, and all exterior doors to the school are locked. If your child is at school prior to 8:45, you are placing him/her in an unsupervised situation. There should be no expectation of students being buzzed into the school prior to 8:45 a.m. The Office will be contacting parents/guardians who do not adhere to this policy, one that is in effect in all publicly funded elementary schools in Ontario.

PUNCTUALITY AND ATTENDANCE

The Education Act (Section 21 and 30) states that children must attend school regularly until the age of 18. Punctuality and attendance at school are directly linked to student success and achievement. Student absenteeism and lates are monitored by the classroom teacher who will contact parents and the Principal and Attendance Counsellor if there continues to be a concern. Research shows that regular and punctual attendance at school has a direct impact on mental health and overall success and well-being for our students. If at any time we can assist you to improve your child's attendance and punctuality, please do not hesitate to call the office.

LUNCH HOUR

It is expected that children who are within walking distance and are able to, go home for lunch. This provides a change of pace in their day and serves as a refresher for their afternoon program. We realize however, that in some cases, it is necessary for students to remain at school. As an Eco school, we encourage boomerang lunches (bins available). Please use reusable water bottles, not plastic water bottles.

Students who have to stay for lunch are expected to follow routines and procedures established and clearly explained to them by their teacher.

Children eat their lunch in designated classrooms from 11:50 a.m. – 12:10 p.m. Students are expected to remain in the playground area (weather permitting) from 12:10 p.m. – 12:45 p.m. **NO CHILD** staying for lunch is allowed to leave the school yard. If a child who stays at school for lunch wished to leave school property at lunch, the following needs to be in place:

The parent/guardian needs to come to the Office to sign out his/her child. The school does NOT accept notes to go out for lunch or to go to a friend's house or any other location.

DRESS CODE

The following guidelines are in place for students regarding appropriate dress and appearance:

- Be attentive to personal grooming, cleanliness and safe footwear;
- Indoor (non-marking soles) and Outdoor shoes are required;
- No flip-flops to ensure safety and to avoid injury;
- Arrive at school in clean, seasonal clothes for both indoors and outdoors
- Wear age appropriate clothing the demonstrates modesty and respect for self and others; no undergarments should be showing;
- Shirts, skirts, and shorts of reasonable length (i.e., non-revealing modest and respectful)
- Shirts and tops must have midriffs covered; sleeveless tops have 3-finger width straps
- Jeans are intact; no ripped jeans;
- Clothing with objectionable logos or messages displaying violence, racism, discrimination, profanity, or promoting inappropriate behavior will not be allowed.

STUDENTS WHO DO NOT ABIDE BY THE DRESS CODE WILL BE ASKED TO COVER UP OR CHANGE.

PARISH COMMUNITIES

Families in the St. Jude Catholic School community belong to two parishes. St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church and St. Bernadette Catholic Church. Geographically, we are in St. Francis de Sales parish. St. Jude Catholic School and Father Peter Jae Choi at St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church work closely together to nurture and develop the faith life of our community.

Daily prayer, religious and family life instruction, liturgical celebrations and social justice projects provide the core of our school life. Father Peter Jae Choi shares in and assists with instruction at our school and at the church and celebrates the Eucharist with us. Parents and Guardians and other family members are always welcomed and encouraged to attend Mass.

Sacramental preparation is the responsibility of the family in conjunction with the parish. Families are requested to attend parish meetings for Sacramental years (Grade 2 – First Reconciliation and First Eucharist and Grade 8 – Confirmation). All information about sacramental preparation should be obtained through the parish. Our classroom teachers assist by providing ongoing instruction and opportunities to practice the Gospel message.

<u>CHANGING THE WAY WE THINK ABOUT</u> HOMEWORK

In recent years, changes in the way teachers think about their assessment practices have caused us to re-examine our beliefs about the importance and nature of homework. The Ministry of Education policy document, *Growing Success*, states that the focus of assessment is "**for**, **as**, and **of** learning." Research tells us that assessment no longer should be seen as just an end product, but a journey of learning along the way where the teacher examines and assesses what a student is learning and understanding at different points. Consequently, if a teacher is assessing a student for and as learning, the teacher must be present during the task. Homework or projects completed entirely at home remove the teacher from the learning journey. There is no empirical data that supports the notion that homework gives students an academic advantage.

The following are guidelines for homework:

- Nightly homework routine should include reading, whether it has been assigned or not; Ongoing review of classwork and concepts covered is also appropriate and recommended
- Homework will only be work that should have otherwise been completed in class, and in the end-stages of assignments or projects
- Students may be assigned incomplete work due to planned absences
- Children need time to be children and to have play time and family time at home
- Homework will not be typically be assigned during holidays (Christmas, Easter, March break, Victoria Day, Family Day weekend)

STUDENT SERVICES

The Durham Catholic District School Board supports the belief that each student is unique, with individual strengths and needs. Our philosophy and policy of Inclusion provides for each student's needs. For students experiencing difficulty or requiring support, services are available at the school level, and are accessed through the School Team Meeting process. If further intervention in needed, system level supports are available through Student Services at DCDSB, including Social Work, Child /Youth Counselling, Psychological Services and Speech and Language Pathologist. Please contact your child's teacher if you would like to meet.
